10 ³⁵ Then James and John, / the sons of Zebedee, / came to him. / "Teacher," / they said, / "we want you to do / for us / whatever we ask."

³⁶ "What do you want me to do for you?" / he asked.

³⁷ They replied, / "Let one of us sit at your right / and the other at your left / in your glory."

³⁸ "You don't know what you are asking," / Jesus said. / "Can you drink the cup I drink / or be baptized with the baptism / I am baptized with?"



not come to be served, / but to serve, / and to give his life / as a ransom for many."

⁴⁶Then they came to Jericho. / As Jesus and his disciples, / together with a large crowd, / were leaving the city, / a blind man, / Bartimaeus / (which means "son of Timaeus"), / was sitting by the roadside begging. / ⁴⁷When he heard / that it was Jesus of Nazareth, / he began to shout, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" / ⁴⁸ Many rebuked him / and told him to be quiet, / but he shouted all the more, / "Son of David, / have mercy on me!" / ⁴⁹Jesus stopped and said, / "Call him."

So they called to the blind man, / "Cheer up! / On your feet! / He's calling you." ⁵⁰ Throwing his cloak aside, / he jumped to his feet / and came to Jesus. / ⁵¹ "What do you want me / to do for you?" / Jesus asked him.

The blind man said, / "Rabbi, / I want to see."



⁵² "Go," / said Jesus, / "your faith has healed you." / Immediately / he received his sight / and followed Jesus along the road.

- 1. Glory: Splendor, heaven, in praise of deity.
- 2. To drink the cup: Go through death

- 3. **Beggar:** Somebody who begs for money or food from strangers; somebody who is very poor.
- 4. **Persistent:** Tenaciously or obstinately continuing despite problems or difficulties; Existing or continuing for a long time

Questions

- 1. Why do you think Bartimaeus would choose this place to beg for money?
- 2. What did Bartimaeus do to attract the attention of Jesus?
- 3. What is uproar? Was Bartimaeus persistent? What did he want Jesus to do?
- 4. Bartimaeus called Jesus the Son of David? What did that mean?
- 5. Do you think Bartimaeus had faith that Jesus could actually make him see again?
- 6. Bartimaeus began with a need, went on to gratitude, and finished with loyalty. Do you think those are the stages of discipleship?

Notes

- 1. A few facts to realize:
 - Jericho was a city just 15 miles from Jerusalem.
 - Jesus was going to Passover.
 - The religious law said that every male over 12 years of age must attend the Passover.

- Those unable to go customarily lined the streets and cheered on the pilgrims as they went.
- Jericho was a special town. Many priests and Levites that served the Temple lived in Jericho.
- The Temple used, on a rotating basis, 20,000 priests. They were divided into 26 groups.
- At the Passover time, all the priests were on duty to serve so many people.
- Many priests were hostile to Jesus because Jesus did not obey the Law as orthodoxy required.
- 2. Jesus attracted a large crowd of people who wanted to hear him, but also many many pilgrims were on to road ready to go to Passover.
- 3. It was the custom for a Rabbi or teacher to actually teach the people as they all walked along together.
- 4. In the Jewish tradition, / a *Levite* is a member /of the Hebrew tribe of Levi. / When Joshua led the Israelites / into the land of Canaan, / the Levites were the only Israelite tribe / who received cities / but no tribal land / "because the Lord / the God of Israel himself / is their possession". / The Tribe of Levi / served particular religious duties / for the Israelites / and had political responsibilities as well. / In return, / the landed tribes were expected to give tithe to the Levites, / particularly / the tithe known as the Maaser Rishon or Levite Tithe.
