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Command 4: Rejoice

From Matthew 5:12

"Blessed are those / who are persecuted / because of righteousness, / for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

"Blessed are you / when people insult you, /persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you / because of me. / ¹²Rejoice and be glad, / because great is your reward in heaven, / for in the same way / they persecuted the prophets / who were before you.

What this Command says to us


- Different value systems can easily clash.
- Severe disagreements are often inevitable.
- God has an understanding and sympathy with those who follow an opposite path from the world.
- Handling persecution and forgiving bring peace.
- Human nature doesn't like people who are different.
- Rejoice because your strength in God can pull believers through difficult times.
- Believer's reward is in heaven.
- Jesus Rejoiced, and he also experienced persecution.

- 1. Value System: One's **value system** / is molded by one's virtues or vices. A person's standards and self-discipline set, / based on the common sense / and the wisdom of knowing / what the proper moral rules and discipline are, / and the amount of willingness / to see themselves / and others abide by them.
- 2. Clash: Confrontation. Argument. Fight. Quarrel. Disagreement.
- 3. Inevitable: Unavoidable. Destined. Can't be prevented.
- 4. Persecution: Hostility. Bad treatment. Harassment, especially because of race, or political or religious beliefs.
- 5. To handle (handling): Feel or manipulate with the hands. Manage a problem. Control or defend yourself. (Verb usage)
- 6. To experience: Contact with and observation of facts or events. *He experienced loneliness in the first months of being in the USA.*

Trials and Temptations

²Consider it pure joy, / my brothers and sisters, / whenever you face trials of many kinds, / ³because you know / that the testing of your faith / produces perseverance. / ⁴Let perseverance / finish its work / so that you may be mature / and complete, / not lacking anything.

What this Command says to us

- Consider it Joy does not mean it is Joy.
- This value judgment is a mental one. It means to think about it or regard it as an occasion to be turned to our highest good.
- All will face troubles and trials. But we learn something from them.
- James, the brother of Jesus, and a leader in Jerusalem uses the address, my brothers and sisters, as an equal to them.
- Trials and persecution are both taking place at this time.
- Comes from the conviction that adversity strengthens character.
- The proverb, *Every cloud has a silver lining*, also expresses this thought.
- Perseverance matters. Humans often resist that.

- 3. Don't we all: Something a lot of people agree on. *I like chocolate. Sure, don't we all!*

Command 5: Let your light shine

From Matthew 5:16

¹⁴"You are the **light** of the **world**. A **town built** on a **hill** can**not** be hidden. ¹⁵ Neither do **people light** a **lamp** and **put** it under a **bowl**. Instead they **put** it on its **stand**, and it **gives light** to **everyone** in the **house**.

¹⁶In the **same way, let** your **light shine** before **others**, that they may **see** your **good deeds** and **glorify** your **Father** in **heaven**.

What this Command says to us

Matthew 5:14-16 The Message (MSG) (Use your body language.)

- 14-16 "Here's another way to put it: You're here to be light, bringing out the God-colors in the world.
- God is not a secret to be kept. We're going public with this, as public as a city on a hill.
- If I make you light-bearers, you don't think I'm going to hide you under a bucket, do you? I'm putting you on a light stand.
- Now that I've put you there on a hilltop, on a light stand—shine!
- Keep open house; be generous with your lives. By opening up to others, you'll prompt people to open up with God, this generous Father in heaven.

Command 6: Honor God's Law

From Matthew 5:17-19

Honor God's law—Matthew 5:17-19. New International Version

17 "Do not think / that I have come to abolish the Law / or the

Prophets; / I have not come to abolish them / but to fulfill them. / 18 For
truly I tell you, / until heaven and earth disappear, / not the smallest
letter, / not the least stroke of a pen, / will by any means disappear
from the Law / until everything is accomplished. / 19 Therefore anyone
/ who sets aside one of the least of these commands / and teaches
others accordingly / will be called least in the kingdom of heaven, /
but whoever practices / and teaches these commands / will be called
great in the kingdom of heaven.

The Message Bible

"Don't suppose for a minute / that I have come to demolish the Scripture— / either God's Law / or the Prophets. / I'm not here to demolish but to complete. / I am going to put it all together, / pull it all together in a vast panorama.

18God's Law is more real and lasting / than the stars in the sky / and the ground at your feet. / Long after stars burn out / and earth wears out, / God's Law will be alive and working. / 19"Trivialize even the smallest item in God's Law / and you will only have trivialized yourself. / But take it seriously, / show the way for others, / and you will find honor in the kingdom.

Communication

A **University of Pennsylvania study** reported that the majority of **communication** is transmitted non-verbally.

70% of **communication** is body language,

Facial expressions, clothing and outside appearance, body movements

23% is voice tone and inflection, and only Sound angry? Happy? Concerned? Serious? Questioning?

7% is your spoken words!

The goal is to have your **non-verbal** message match your verbal message.

Command 7: Be Reconciled

From Matthew 5:23-25. NIV

²³Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother or sister has something against you, ²⁴ leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to them; then come and offer your gift.

²⁵ "Settle matters quickly with your adversary who is taking you to court. Do it while you are still together on the way, or your adversary may hand you over to the judge, and the judge may hand you over to the officer, and you may be thrown into prison

What this Command says to us

- Jesus continues his *Sermon on the Mount* by helping his listeners know what they should do.
- If a person plans to worship God, he must be right with his fellow men, his brothers.
- Disagreements lead to trouble, perhaps, hate, and perhaps murder.
- Settle the matters another person has against you.
- Pay your bills. Speak honestly and kindly.
- Make peace between you and your "enemies."
- If not, the problem may only grow.
- Jesus takes this as far as the court system, and there the person might just lose and go to prison or jail.
- Make peace. Then bring your gifts to God.
